

"The Farm," featuring several hydroponic growing methods and producing microgreens, basil, tomatoes, peppers, and several different microgreens and lettuce varieties, is making progress! The various growing methods are functioning well and the students taking the "21st Century Agriculture" class are learning how to manage the whole system.

Of course, once you have produce, you need to do something with it! Shelley Bacon was tasked with marketing the produce to local restaurants and specialty markets in the Spokane area. To date, microgreens have been delivered to some of the area's top restaurants: Wild Sage, Clo-



ver, Wandering Table, and Latah Bistro. Our local Spangle Harvester Restaurant has ordered Romaine lettuce, and the UCA cafeteria has a standing order for lettuce which is is harvested and delivered daily. We are now providing most if not all of the lettuce needed by the caf, as well as fresh basil. The Farm also delivers lettuce to My Fresh Basket and Main Market in Spokane (see photos above).

TIME CAPSULE REMA

It was early June just over 20 years ago, and an excited group of seniors – the class of 1998 – were getting ready for their eminent graduation in just a few days. Class president Mark Janke was dutifully working on graduation details when someone from the class asked him for an item to put into a "time capsule." Apparently, the idea to create a time capsule and bury it was a spontaneous one. Someone who lived locally produced a 30+ plastic gallon drum from their farm, and others asked each classmate to add something to the time capsule. Great care was taken to seal the drum so moisture



wouldn't ruin the contents over the course of the next 20 years the time frame that had been determined for when it would be dug up and opened again. A site was chosen, near the memorial tree that had been planted to honor classmate Erin Edgerton who had passed away in December. There was much excitement as the hole was dug and the container buried. Somewhere in the midst of the confusion, a classmate snapped a few photos to commemorate the moment.

Twenty years seems like an eternity to a student graduating from academy, but as time tends to do, the years flew

by and the 20th reunion neared. Alumni director Shelley Bacon was contacted by Brooke Miner Segabartt in the spring of 2018, with a request to help find the location of the time capsule. At first, this seemed like an easy request. Surely someone had marked the spot, or taken GPS coordinates, or SOMETHING. Multiple contacts were made to various class members, sponsors, former faculty, and others to find more information about the exact location of the capsule. The current maintenance and grounds people at UCA tried several times using different methods to identify where it was. Two times people used metal detectors to help in the search, with the hope that something metal had been included in the contents. No luck.

Alumni homecoming weekend approached and anticipation was high that the time capsule's contents would be revealed. Classmates drove in from around the area, and flew in from around the country, and even the world – Joel

Mundall coming from as far away as Honduras – in part to witness the big reveal of the time capsule. Sabbath afternoon, the class gathered on the hillside where most agreed the capsule had been buried. "20 feet and 98 degrees" had

been bantered about as to the location of the barrel. The thinking was it was going to be 20 years before it was dug up, and this was the mighty class of '98 that had this brilliant idea to capture mementos of themselves at the end of their high school years and produce them 20 years later

for their matured selves to reflect upon. This 20 feet and 98 degree location had been thoroughly vetted already with no sign of the capsule, but the class was just sure it had to be located in that area. Class members procured shovels and started digging. Pastor Fred, current UCA Bible teacher who also taught the class of '98 as one of his first classes, joined in. Lisa (Gilbert) Winn texted her mom, who was able to find the photo Lisa had taken of the original event and send it via technology that would only have been dreamed about in 1998. Everyone stood around comparing



the photo to the current physical landscape. Marvin Thorman, former UCA math teacher who had come in response to an invitation from the class of '98 and who was assisting in the digging, joined others in analyzing the old photo mathematically to determine the most likely location to dig.

As the afternoon wore on

and no sign of the time capsule appeared, Travis Laws suggested other more significant ways to find this! How about using a back hoe? There was no deterring this class in their efforts to make good on their plans to dig up this red beau-

ty holding the remnants of a bygone era. Hence, the serious digging commenced, and continued until the sunlight dimmed and it was no longer safe to continue. Principal Eric Johnson finally had to call off the search. The hillside was a mess with multiple holes from shovels and large trenches from the backhoe, but alas, no sign of the time capsule had

been found. They had given it their all, but their plans were foiled.

Other methods of locating the time capsule are being considered. If it can be found, perhaps the mighty class of 1998 will once again gather on the hillside near their special memorial tree to open the elusive time capsule. Stay tuned!
