





There on the side of the graveyard hill We laid you a month ago, And God in kindness covered you With a beautiful blanket of snow.


A blanket clean and pure, dear one, A blanket of spotless white, And so as snowflakes gently fall, I think of you tonight.

On my homeward trip I found out that Dorothy Skeels and Dolores Miller were teaching church school in Montana.




