Within the mind of each parent there is a dream for his child. A dream for accomplishments exceeding those of other children. This dream may not always become reality, but it is always imagined.

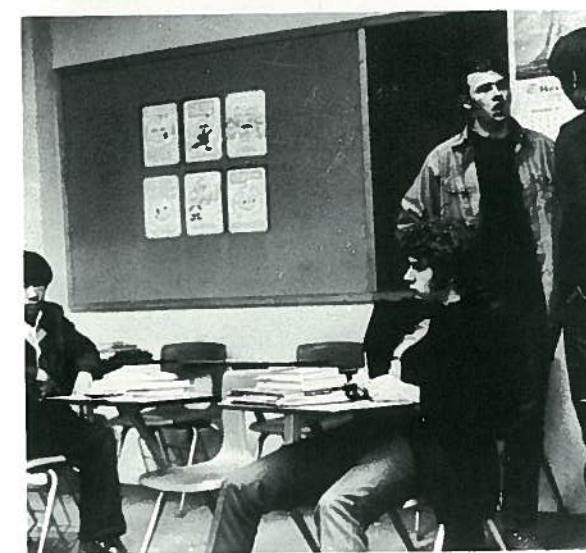
Grasped in each parent's hand is the hand of his child.

But more than this is the great love which flows from each parent's heart. This is what we have needed so much, which no one else could substitute, and it is for this we thank you.



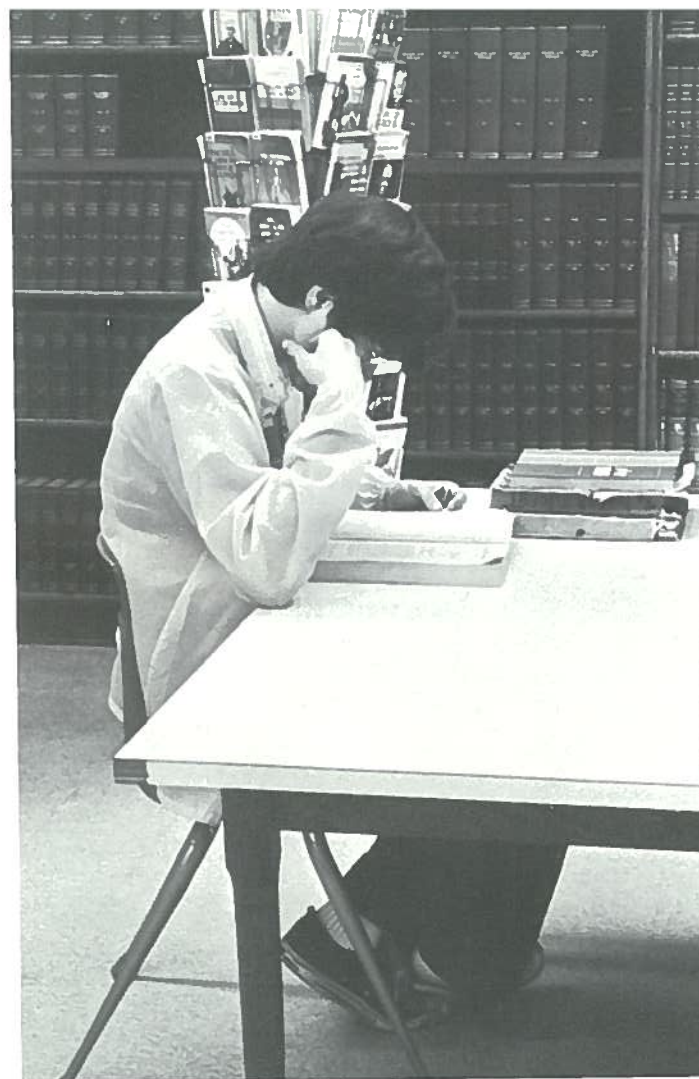

Getting up early to work out, hours of practice, and days of sore muscles paid off for the members of the gymnastics team when they were able to tour several cities in the conference.

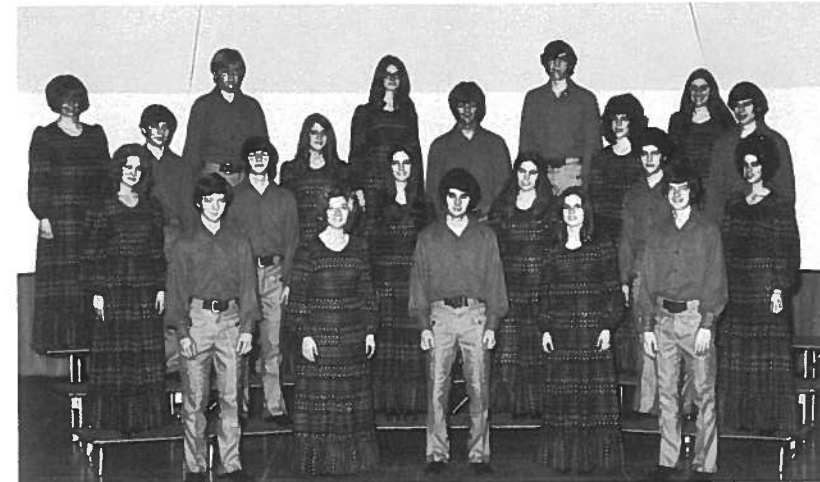
These and many other sports were taught last year, giving the students a well-rounded selection of activities from which to choose.

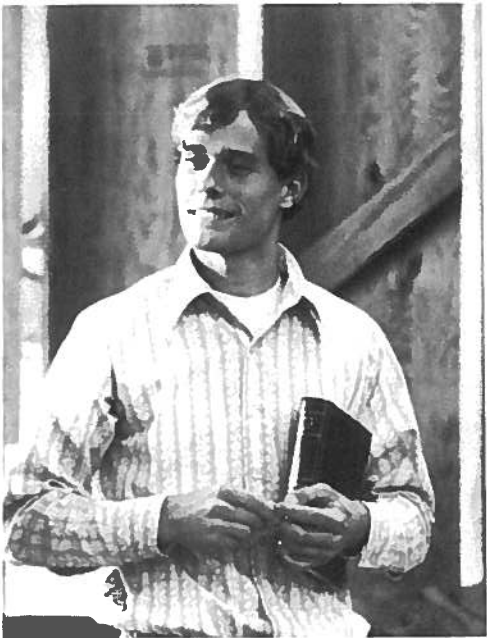
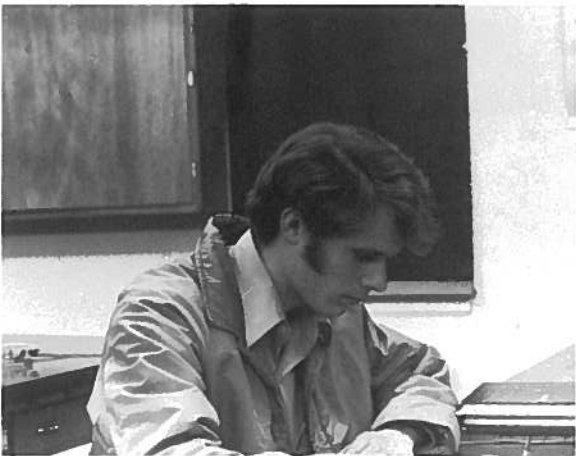
Friends

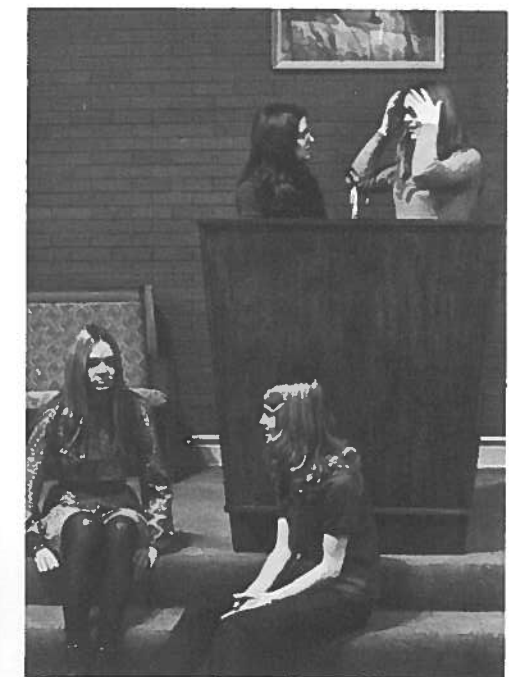
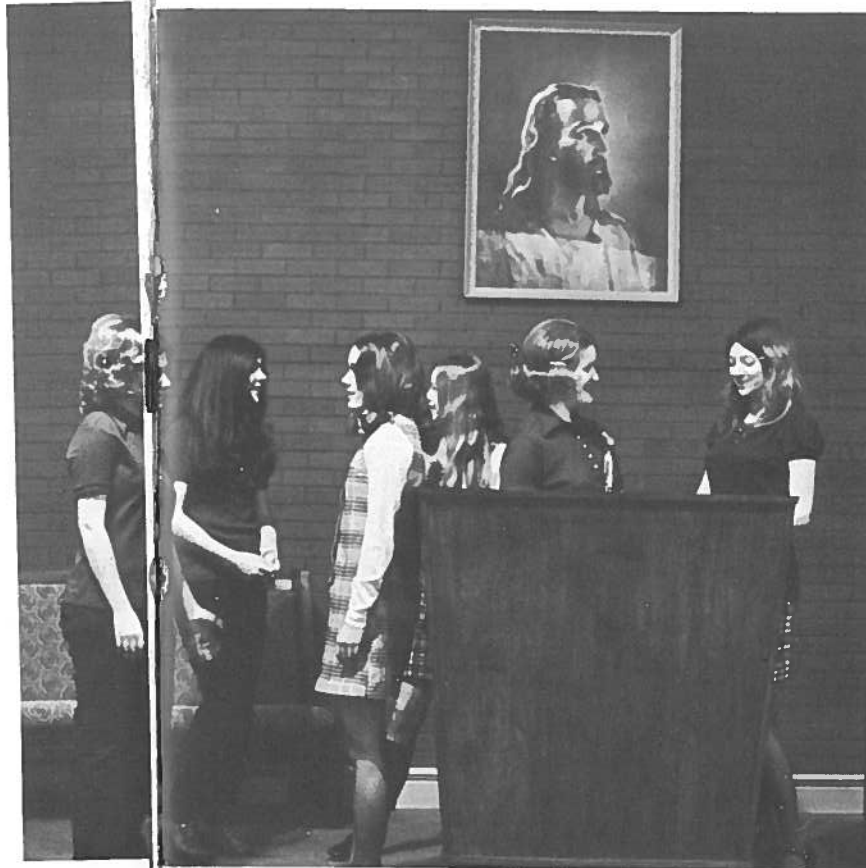


A.D.C. Officers Keep Feminine Side of Campus Lively

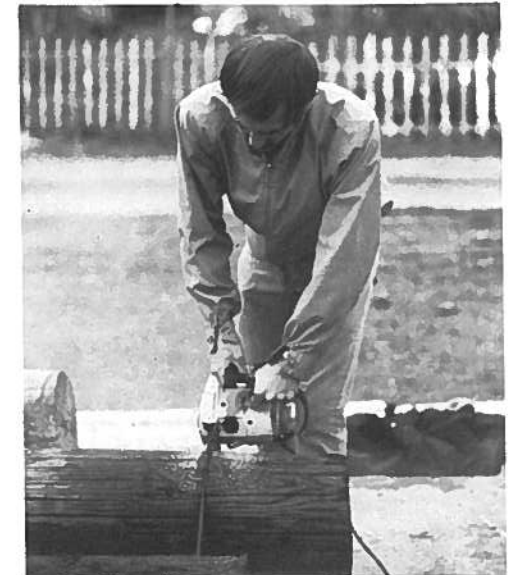
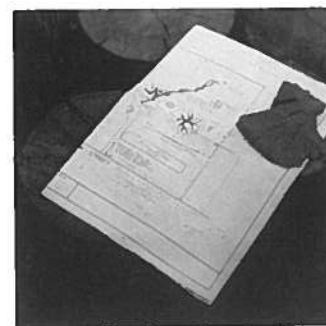


Helping
