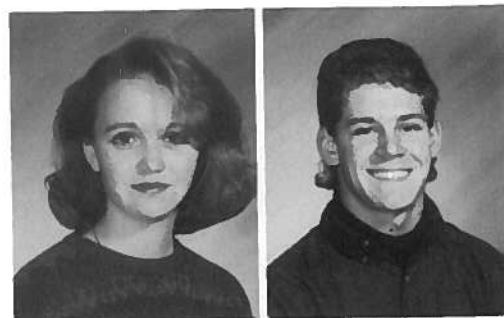
## Junior Time

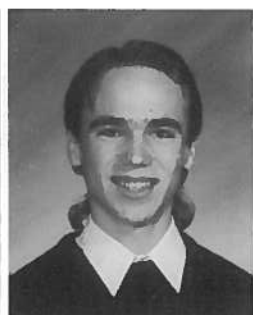
# Cold Showers

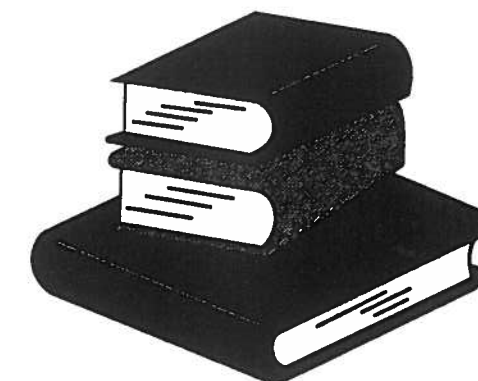
## What! Me, Study! No, Way!

All in all, students at UCA to find time to do other things besides studying and even on that rare occasion we even have time for fun-Shea Walter



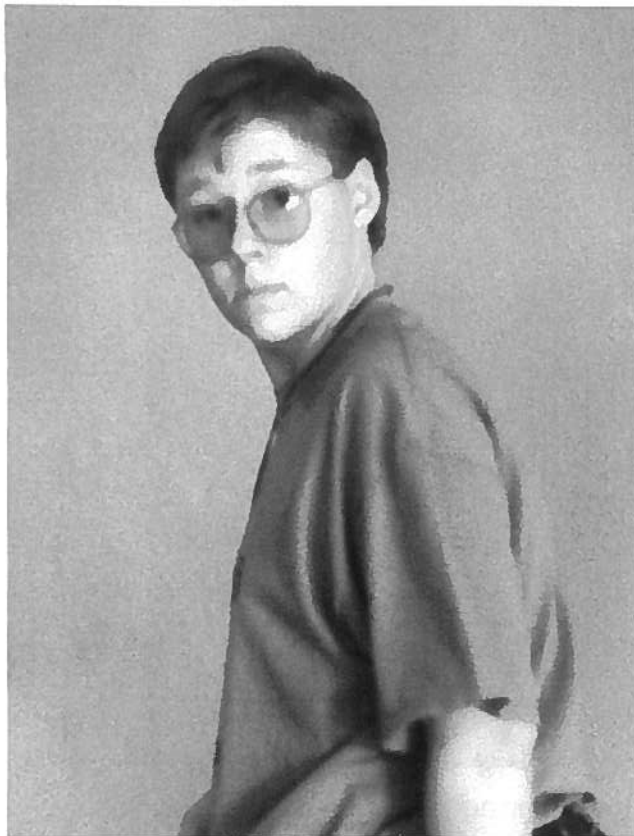




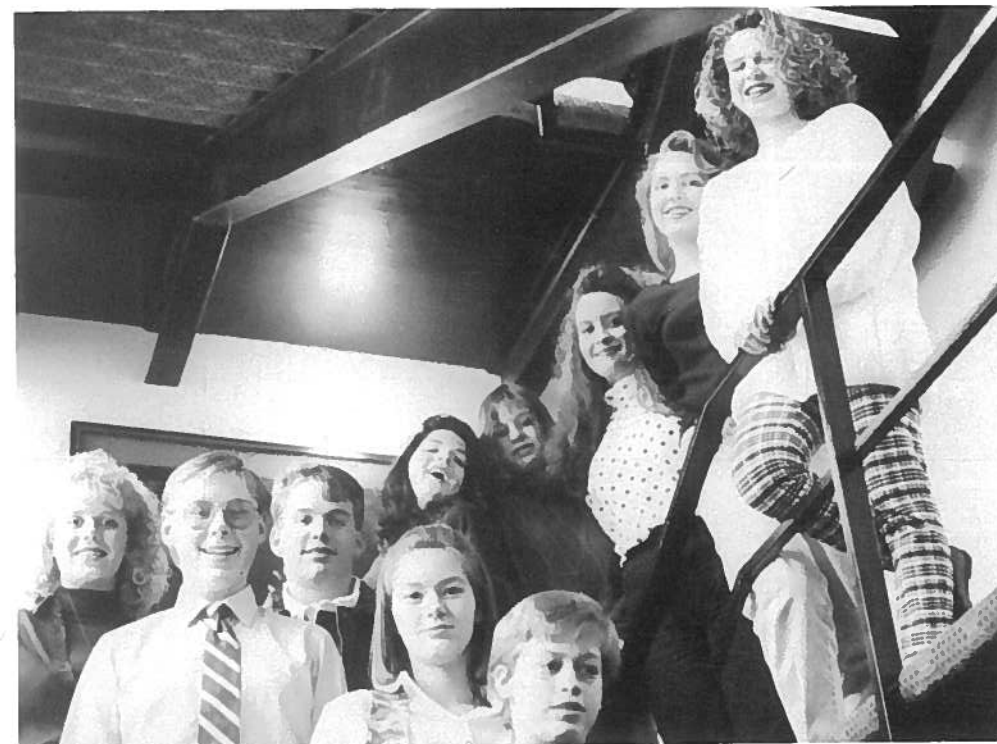

All in all, our freshman year was a good one that was filled with new experiences and FUN, but we are all ready to move on!! - Tammy Heath

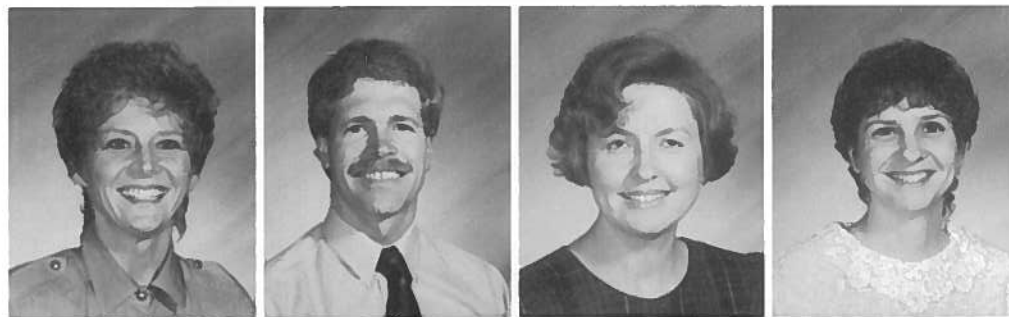

## Music Worth Noting

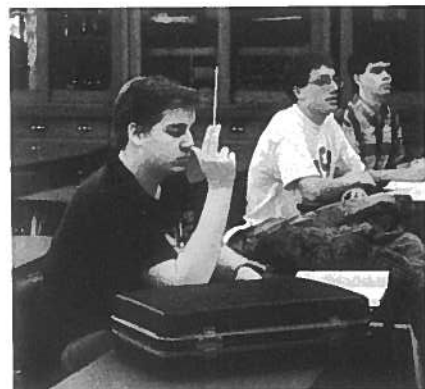

From science class to science class, teaching techniques vary. Mr.

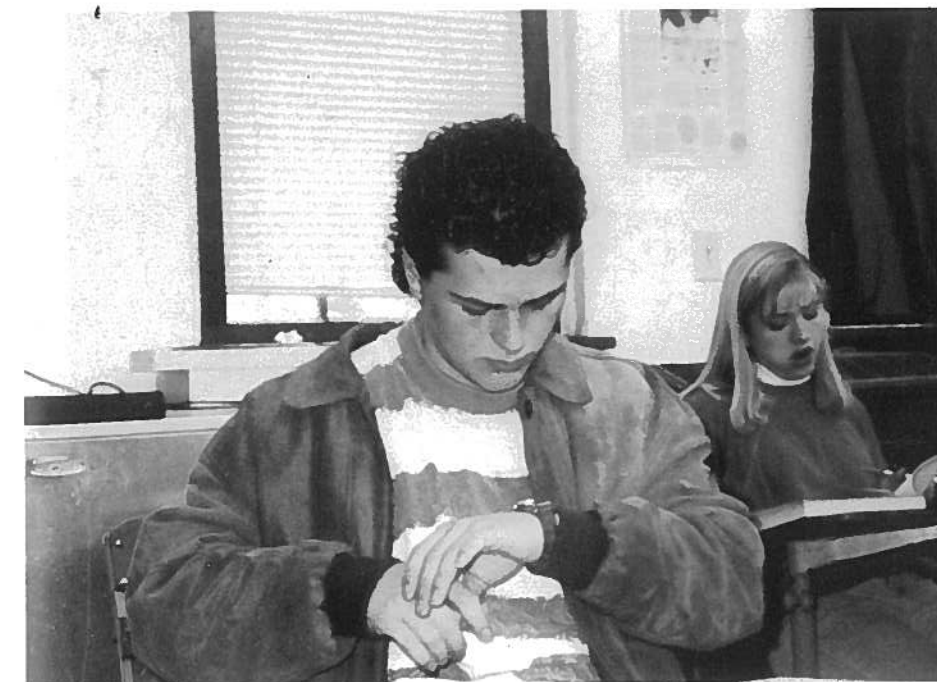

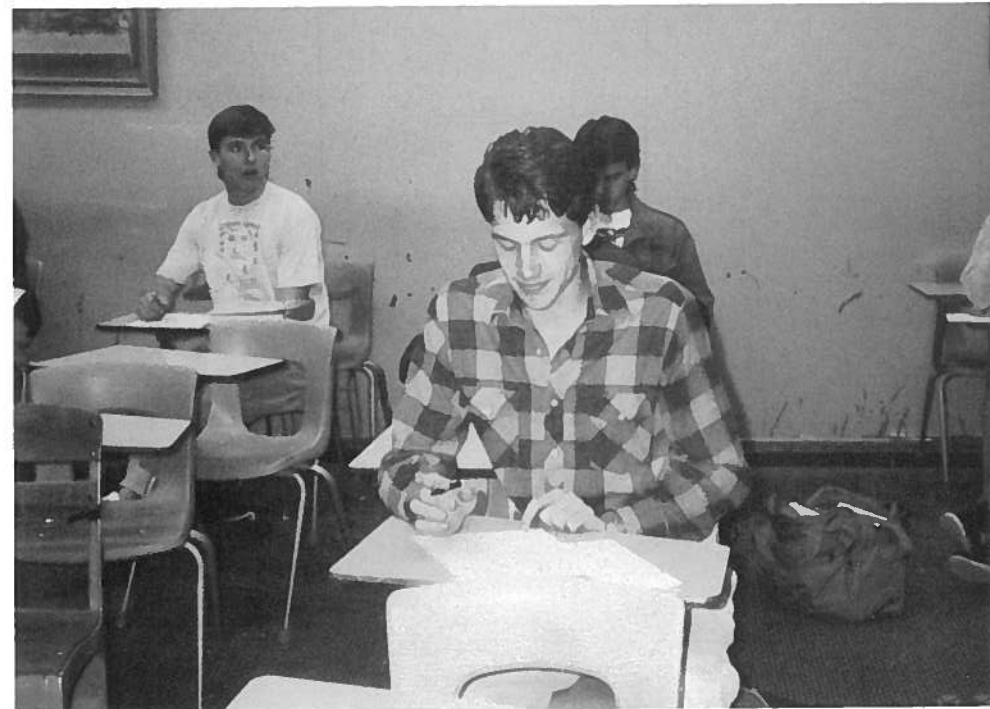


# History . . . Study! Bible . . . Listen!

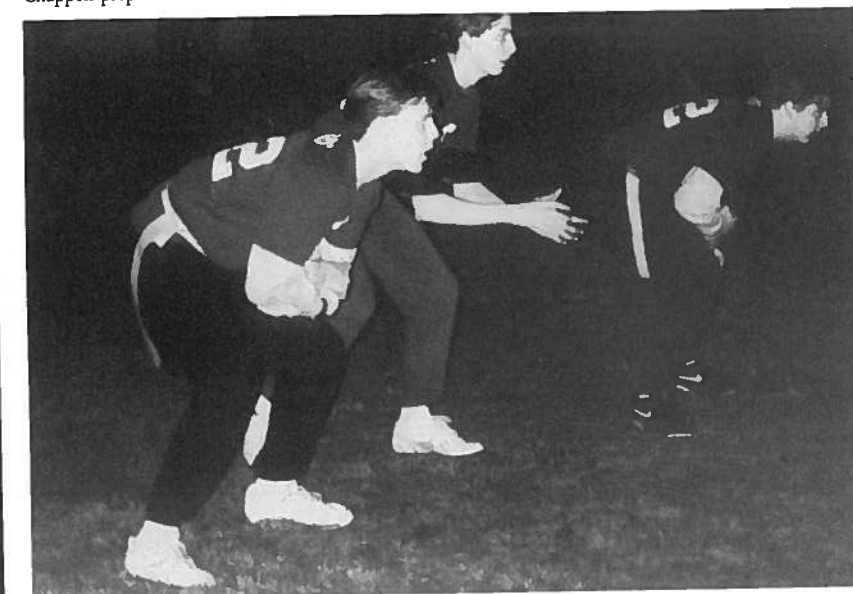

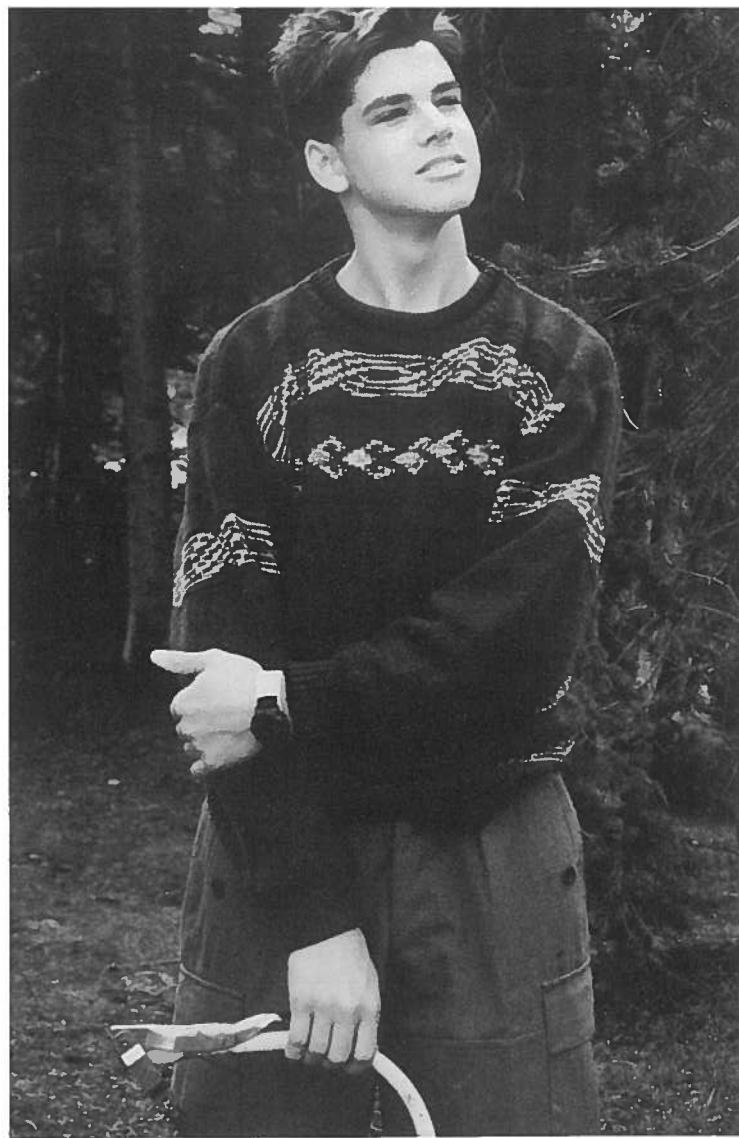


## Off We Go?

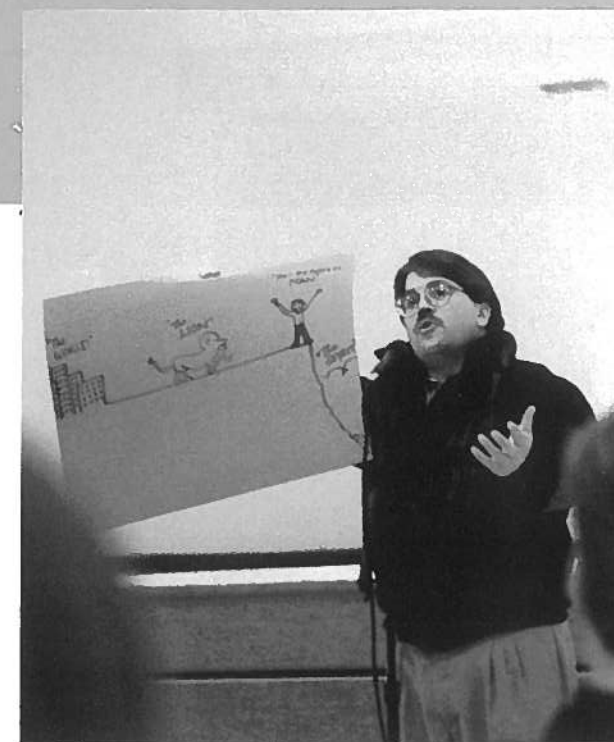

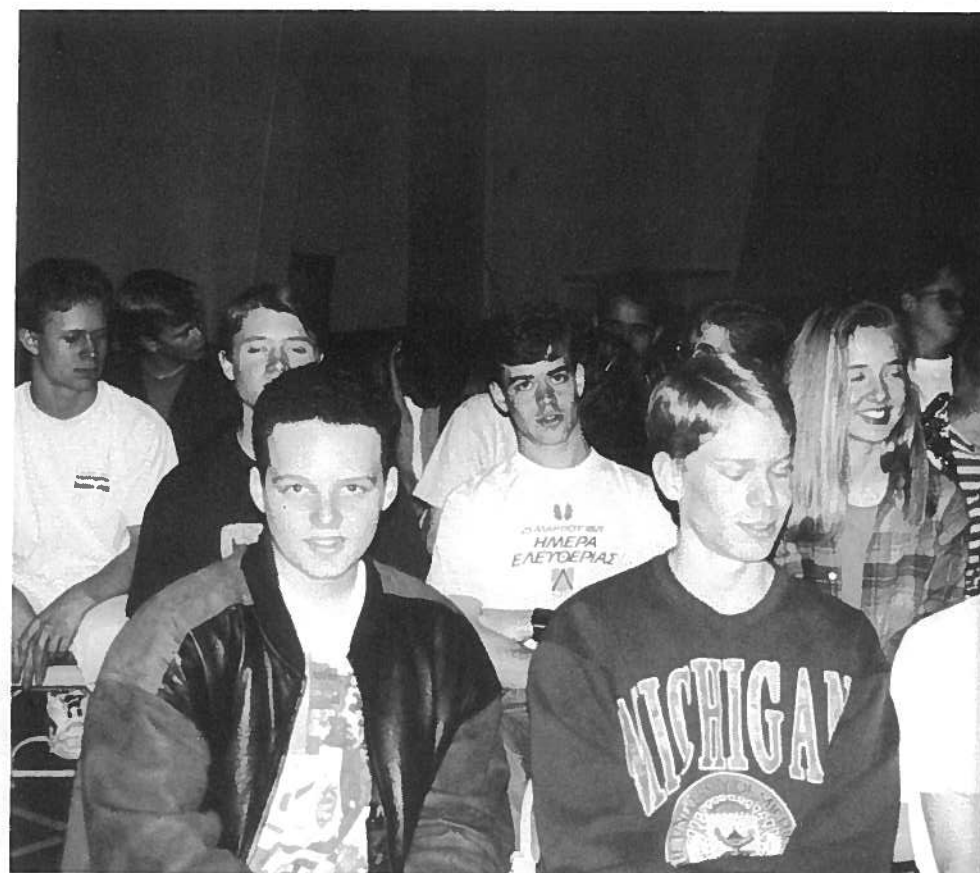
## *Walking Down the Divine Lion's Path*

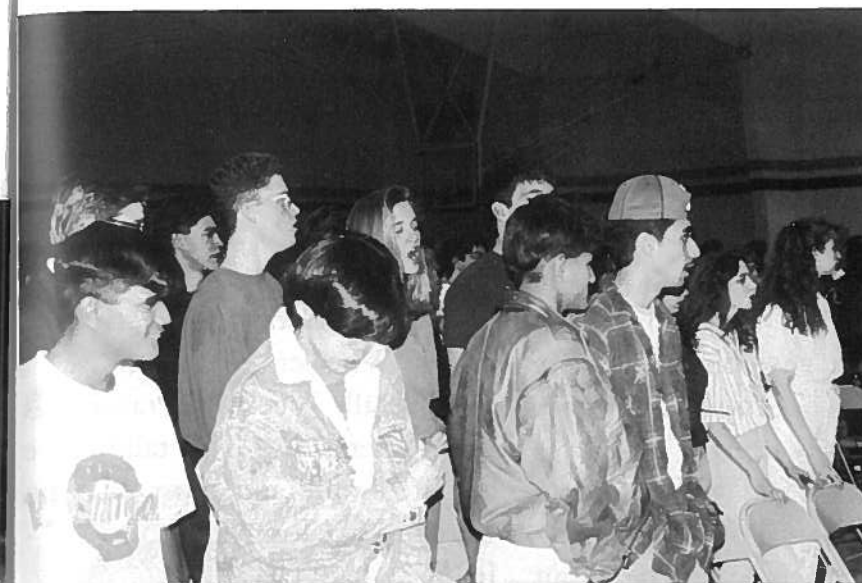

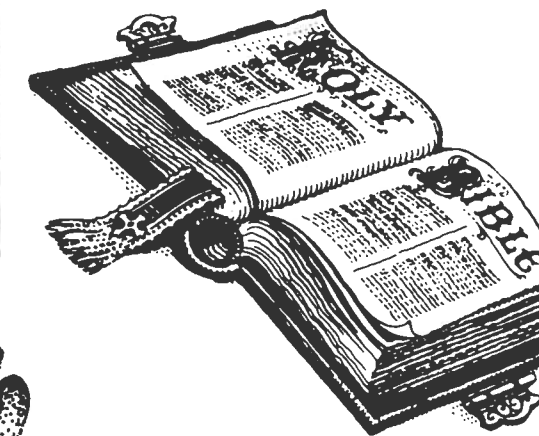

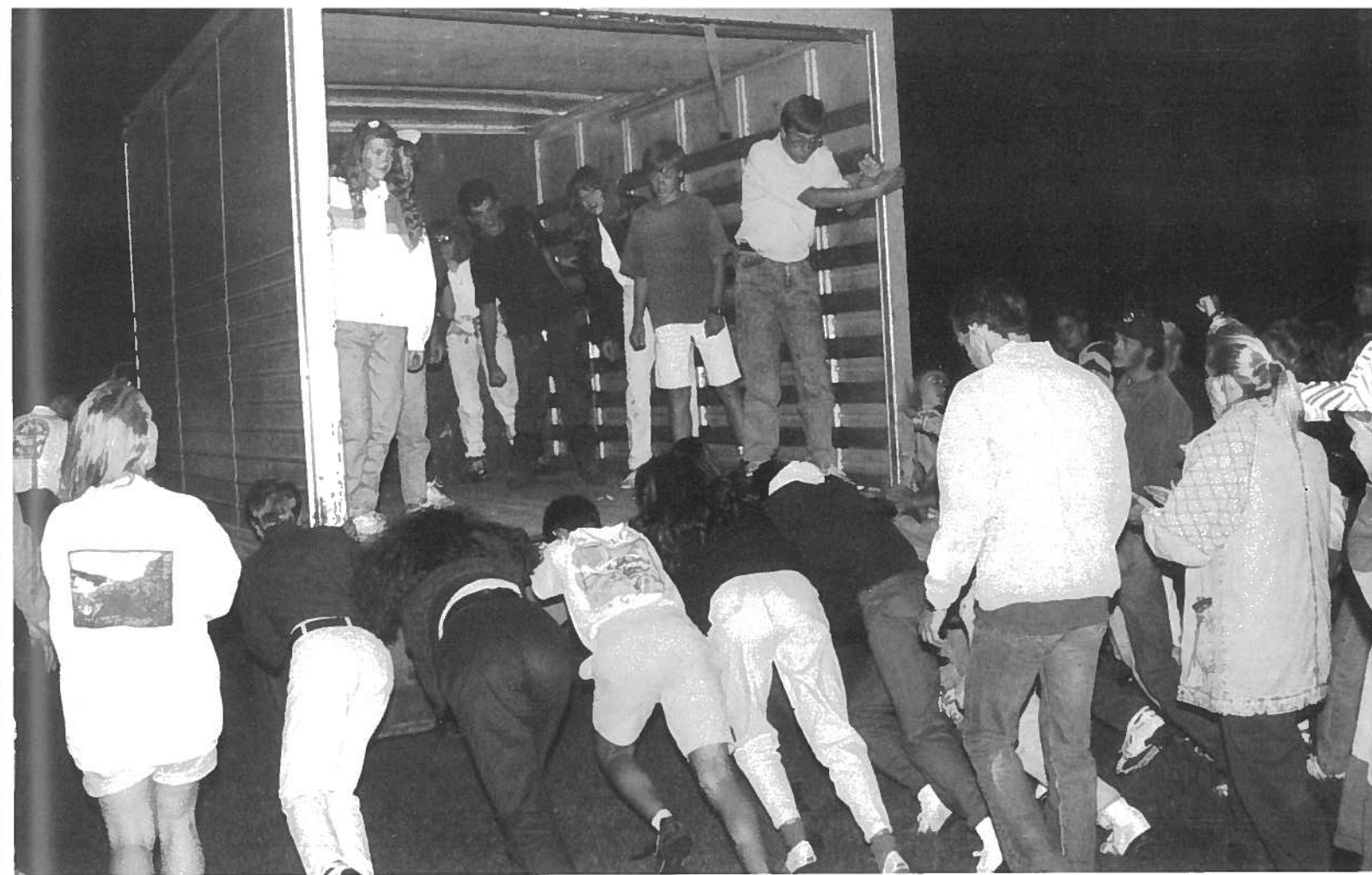
And then the one to top them all . . . a request to the classes "choral groups" to perform "Row, Row Your Boat." The sophomore class

presents a very unique rap that earns a lot of applause.

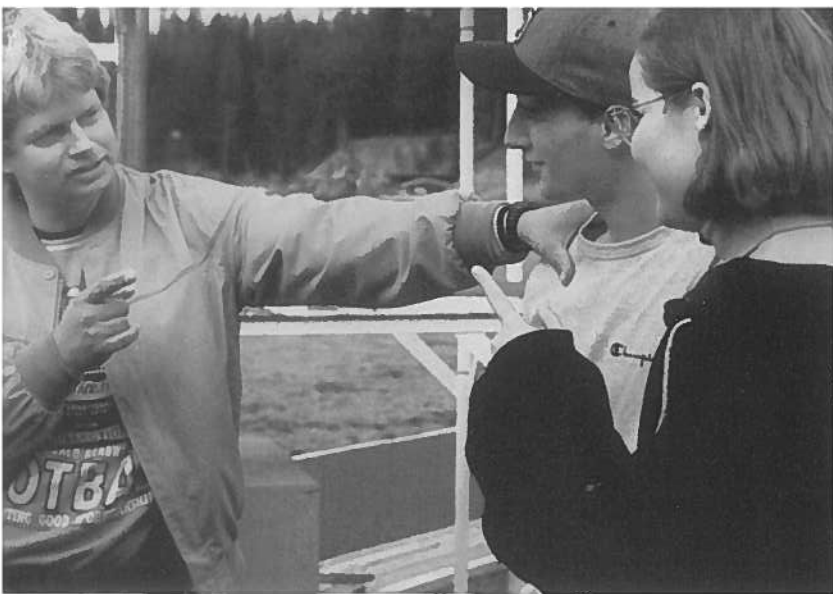
Next, we all troop up to the football field for Tug-of-War and the truck push. Every one of us gave it our best effort, but the Seniors emerge victorious.

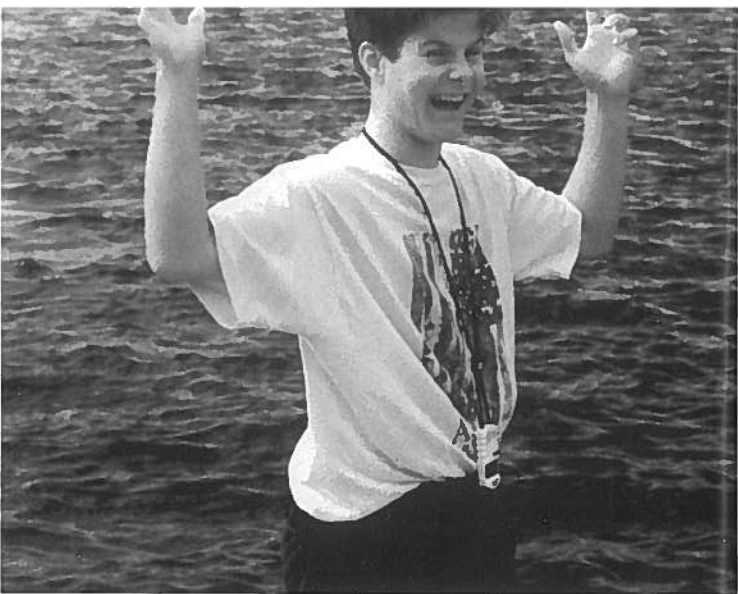

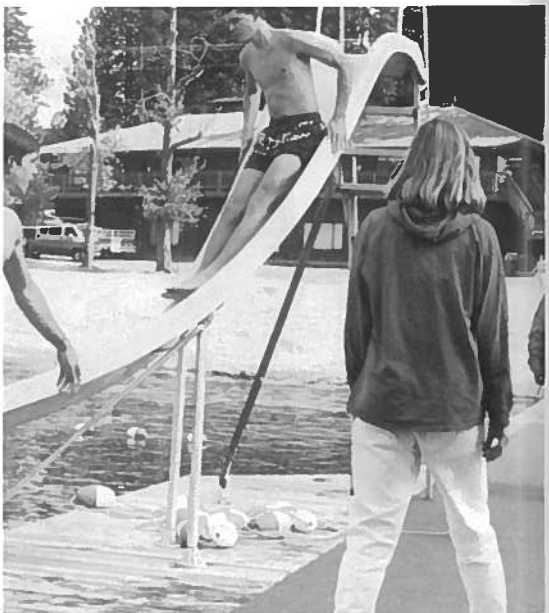

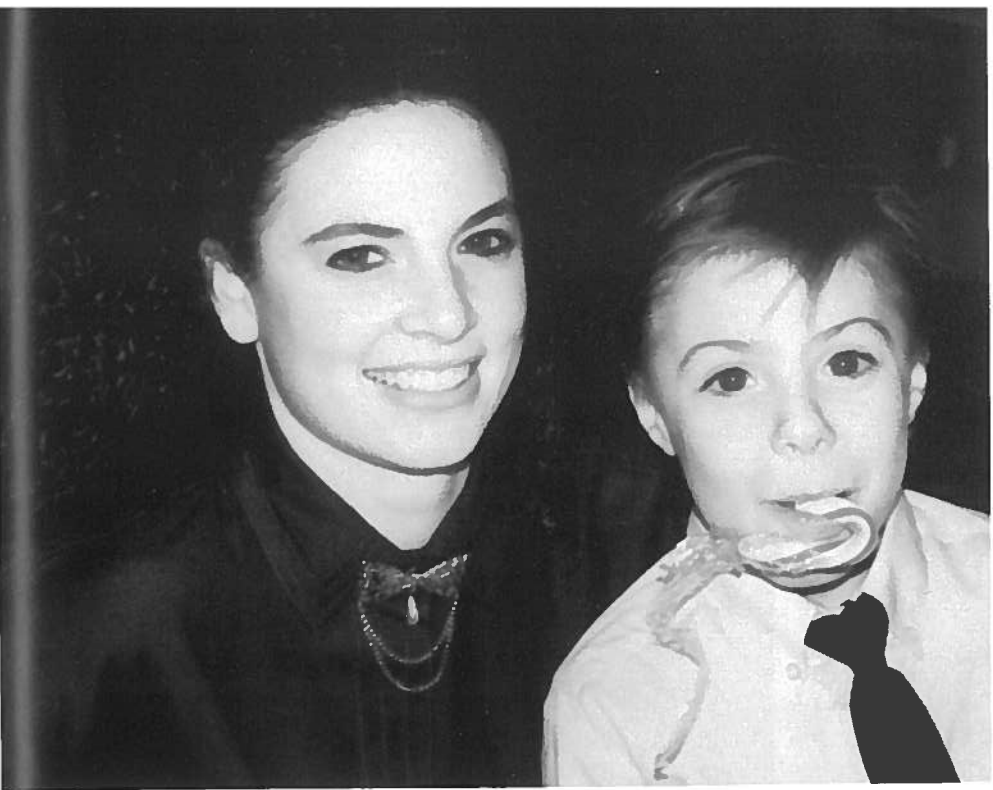


# A Day Worth Remembering

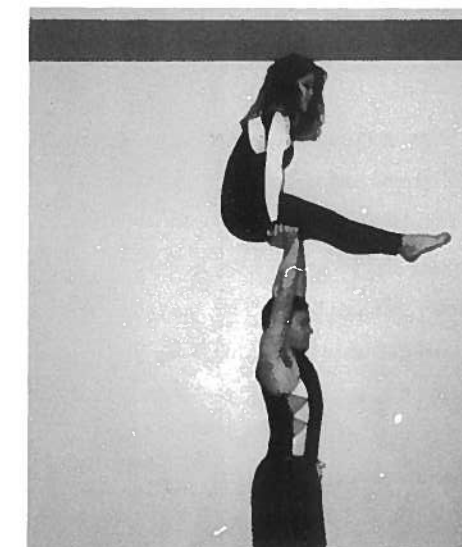

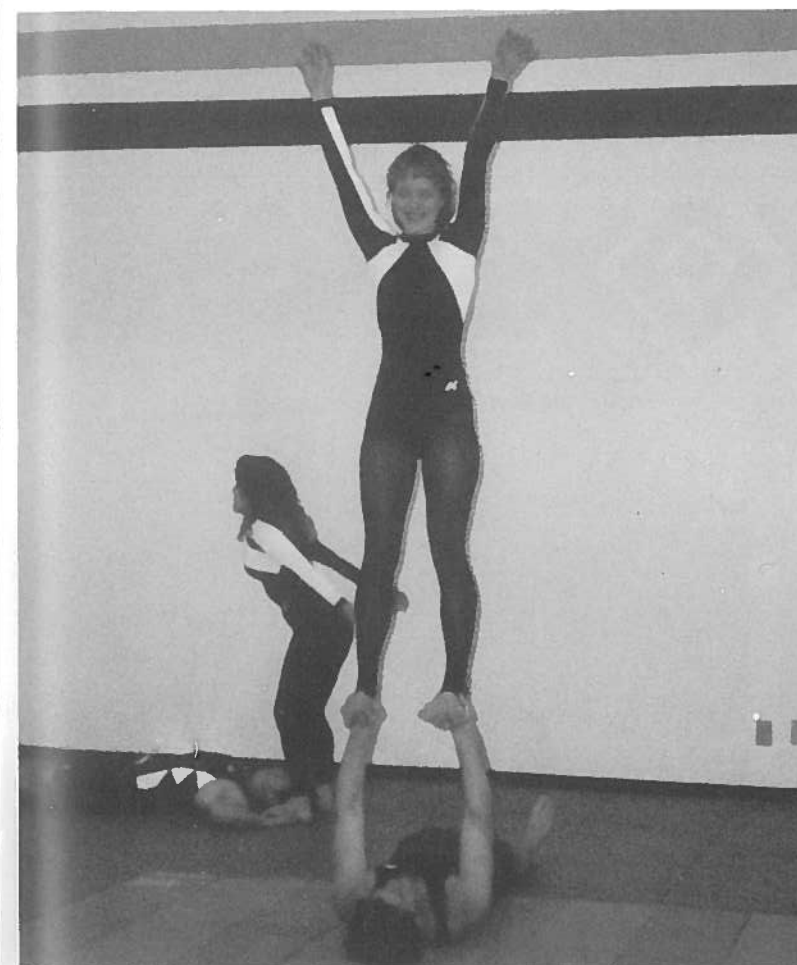

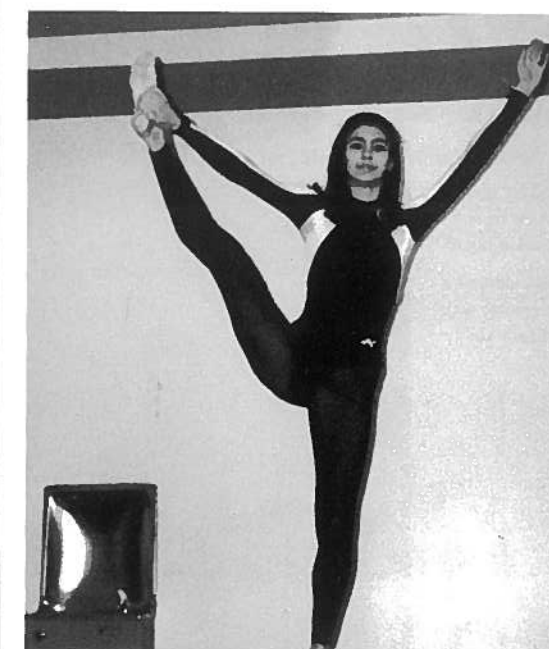
