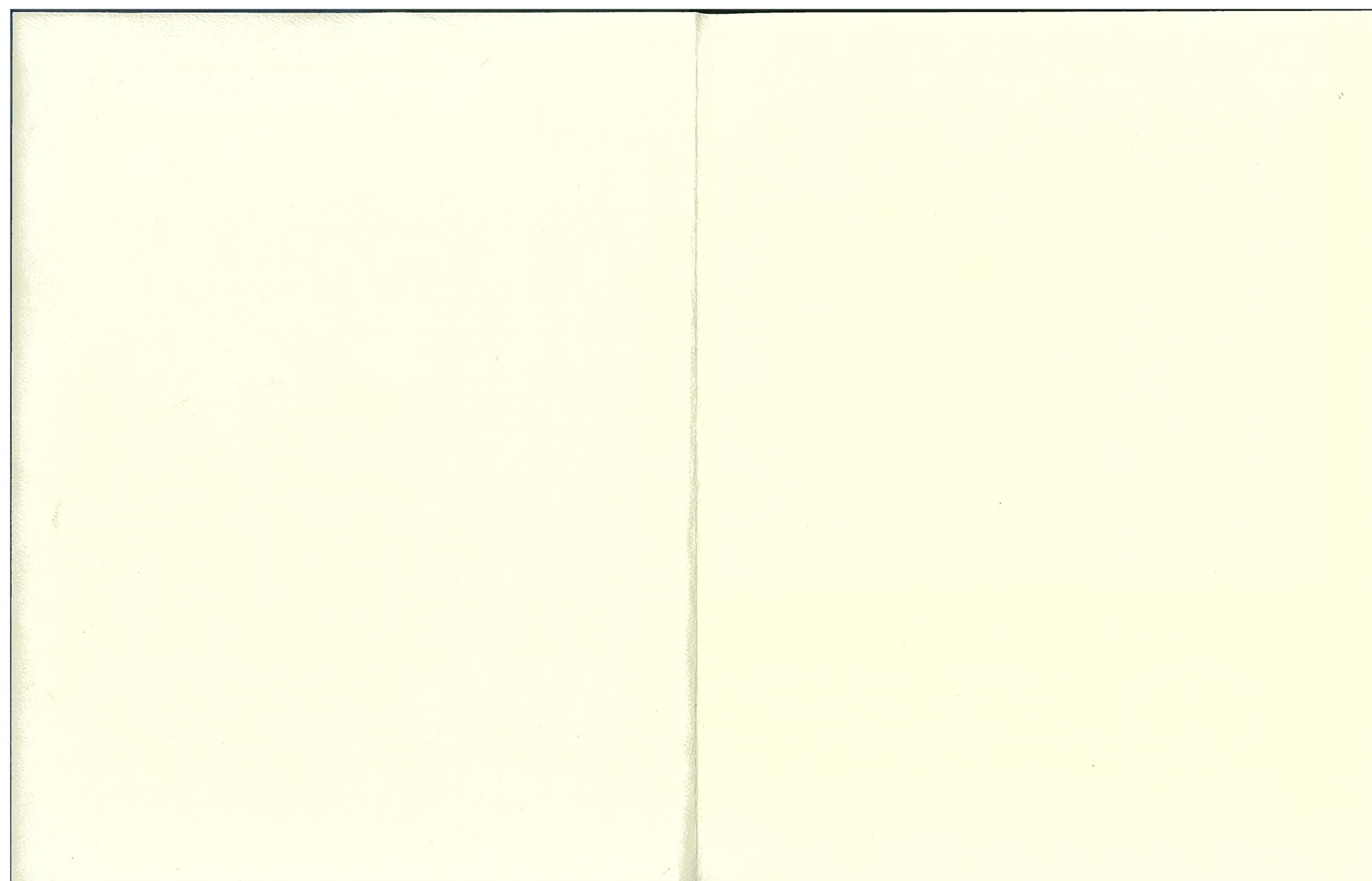

In the fall of 1945, when students arrived on campus, the ashes of World War II had not yet cooled. Less than a month before school started American planes had dropped atom bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Germany (and Europe) was being divided among the victors-and the Cold War was beginning. The buck stopped with Harry S. Truman here in the USA, and "Uncle Joe" Stalin ruled the Soviet Union with an iron grip. General Douglas MacArthur, lately conqueror of the Empire of the Rising Sun, was now Japan's benevolent administrator. And most current UCA faculty had not yet been born!

In the world of sports, the Detroit Tigers beat the Chicago Cubs (you gotta be kidding!) four games to three to win the World Series. The Negro Leagues were in full swing (blacks were not yet allowed in the Big Leagues). Army reigned supreme atop the college football world (with Navy ranked third), while the Cleveland Rams (yes, Rams) defeated the Washington Redskins 15-14 in the National Football League Championship Game. The Boston Yanks and the Chicago Cardinals, however, finished with dismal records. The National Basketball Association had yet to be born, but Oklahoma A&M defeated North Carolina 43-40 capturing their second consecutive National Collegiate Championship. The Montreal Canadians stood atop the National Hockey League after defeating the Boston Bruins in the Stanley Cup finals. George Robson won the Indianapolis 500, Assault captured the Kentucky derby and Joe Louis dominated the boxing world for the ninth consecutive year.

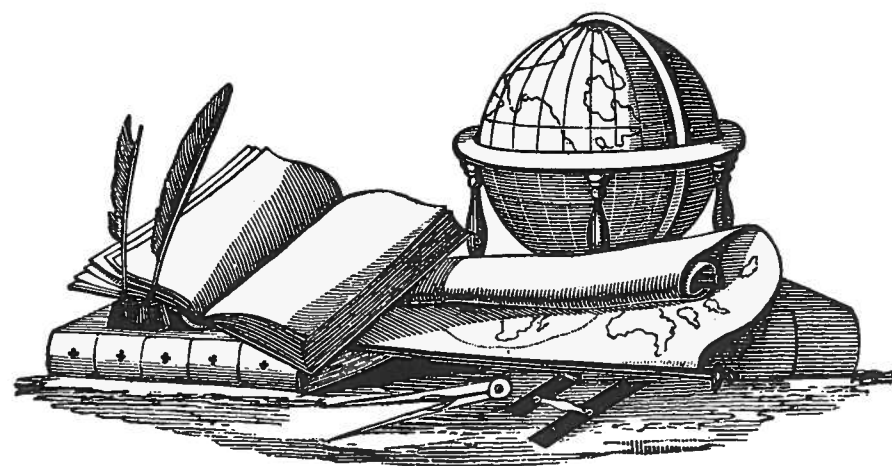

Radio had not yet been given place to television as George Burns, Gracie Allen, Jack Benny, and Milton Berle made people chuckle, and Frank Sinatra and Bing Crosby make the girls swoon.

The nation as a whole was smaller and gentler with forty-eight stars in the flag, 110 million fewer citizens (though many "Baby Boomers" were on the way), and a gang problem that consisted of too many kids hanging out at the "soda shop". The streets of our cities were safe to walk-even at night. And the internet consisted of fish caught in the Columbia River. But we still considered African-Americans to be second-class citizens-especially in the South. Despite the blemishes, we were all proud to be Americans (even the recently released Japanese-Americans who had been interned in western camps since the Pearl Harbor attack).

Yes, alot has changed in fifty years. But some things haven't.

Upper Columbia Academy still has great kids and staff who are dedicated to serving the Lord. The Palouse still has fresh air and vast wheat fields. Academic excellence is still a defining characteristic of our school. But best of all, Jesus is fifty years closer to coming!

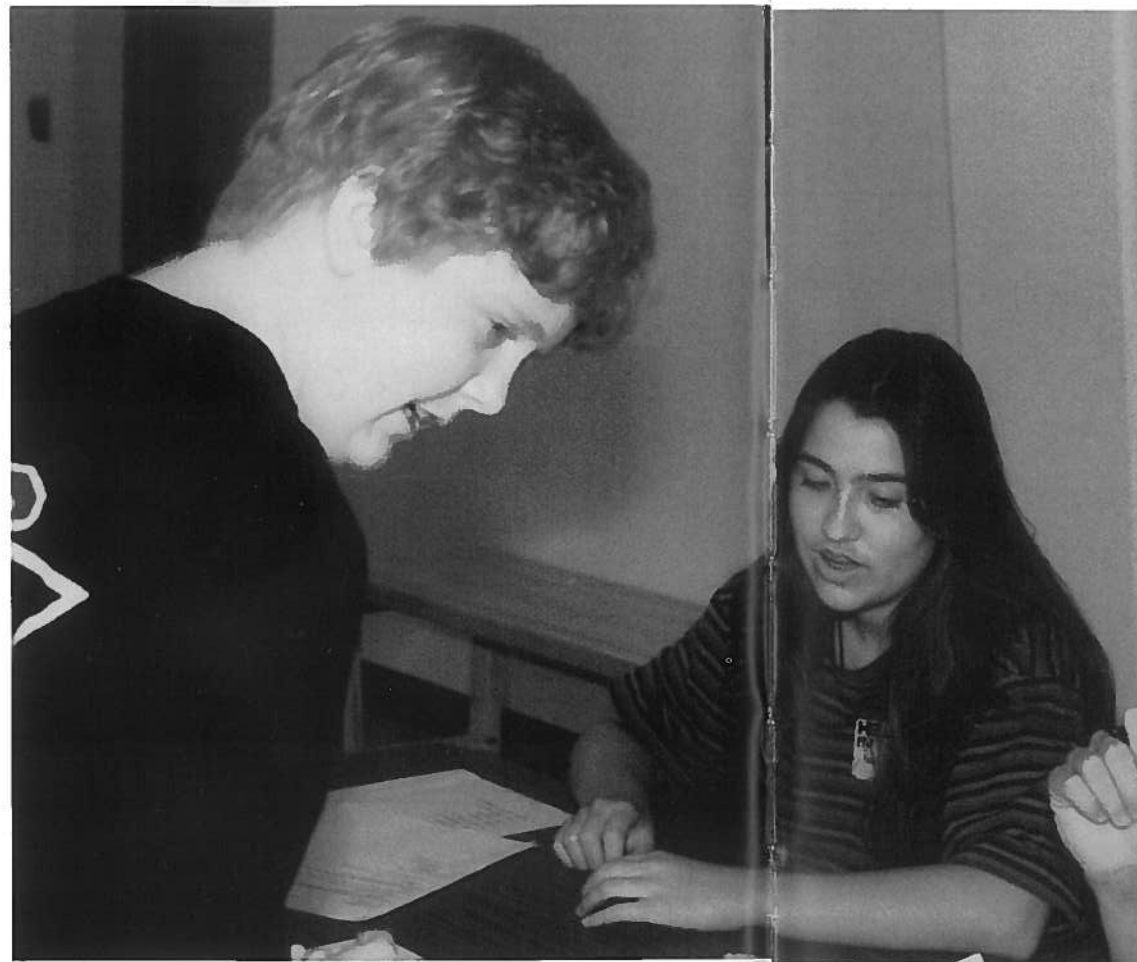
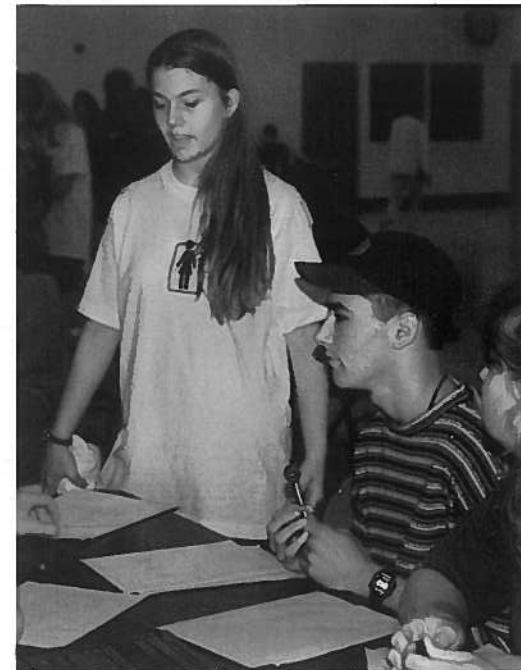
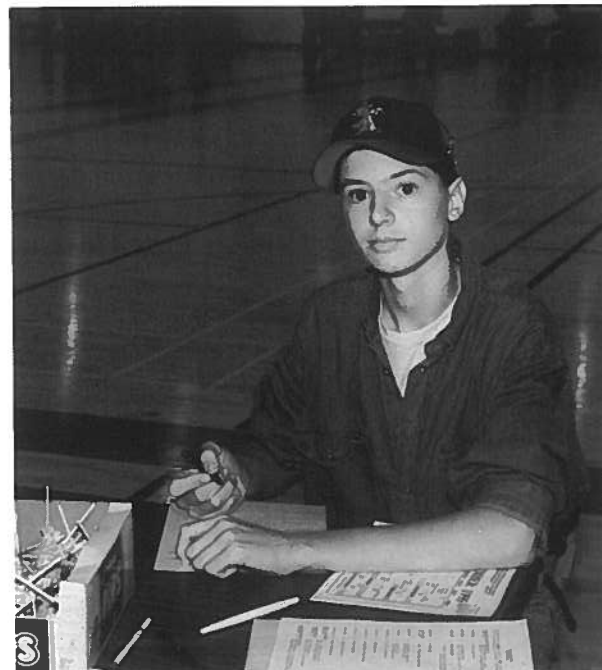
Registration

Upper Columbia Academy

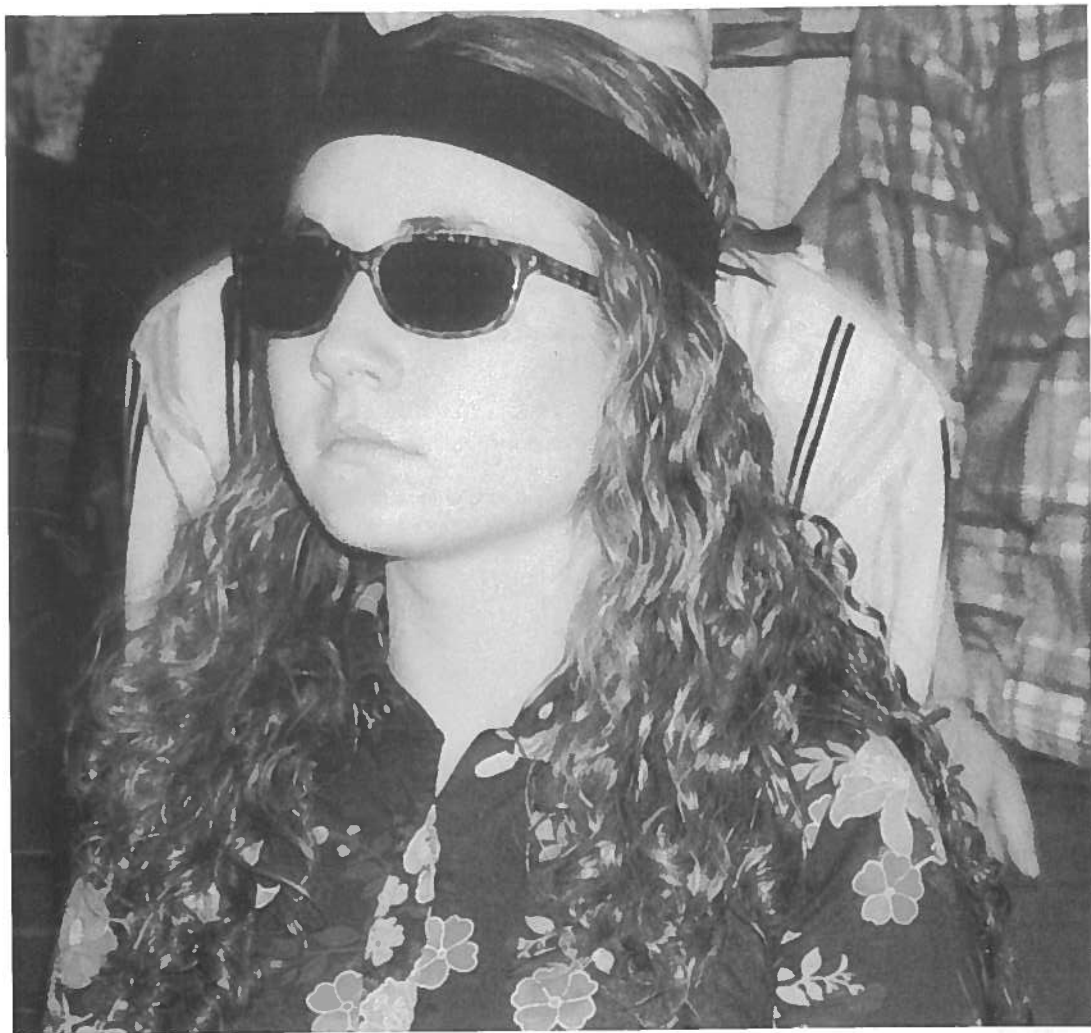

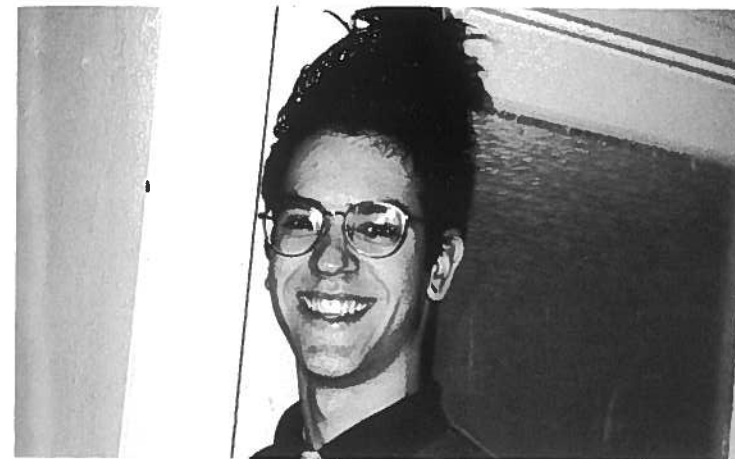
